- Self-assessable vegetation clearing codes, which are now known as acceptable development vegetation clearing codes; and
- Exemptions, which are now known as exempt clearing works.

Introduction

The following tables provide a list of exempt clearing work.

The following three steps will assist you to determine if your proposed activity is exempt clearing work:

- 1. Locate the applicable table below that relates to your land tenure (e.g. freehold, leasehold etc.) Note: Table 1 applies to all land tenures generally.
- 2. Find any applicable clearing activity / purpose in the first column of the table.
- 3. Check the Regulated Vegetation Management Map or regional ecosystem mapping to determine if the mapped vegetation category or status of remnant vegetation for the proposed clearing area is listed in the second column of the table.
