



At the 2018 December General Meeting, Council approved the Tender submission for the design and construction of the Multi-Purpose Sports Centre in Georgetown.


Council must first acknowledge the State Governments 2017-19 Works for Queensland Funding program which has provided the much needed financial assistance to allow Council to build this Centre.


The Centre will incorporate the following:




The Multi-Purpose Sports Centre will commence construction in early February with an estimated completion date being in late May. Council has completed the majority of the building pad and will commence additional work to the site in February in readiness for the construction firm to commence the footings and foundations as required for the building.

#### RESIDENTS OF FORSAYTH NEW WATER RESTRICTIONS

The level of water in Big Reef Dam is now above 3.5 metres. Under Etheridge Shire Council's current Drought Management Plan this level is a trigger point for a change in restriction of water usage. *Level 1* restriction will now apply to all water connections within the Forsayth Water Supply Scheme.

Notice is hereby given of water restrictions in accordance with the Local Government Act and the Water Act 2002 Section 388(1) Restricting water supply.

The following restrictions are effective from:

## Telehealth and video consultation services

The Royal Flying Doctor Service Cairns Base is now providing extended telehealth services for people living in North Queensland.

On Saturdays and Sundays from 8:00 am to 5:30 pm the Cairns Base will now have a dedicated second doctor based in the office to provide phone and video consultations, with access to electronic medical records.

#### To contact the weekend telehealth service:

- Call the RFDS Medical line on 07 4040 0500 or 1300MYRFDS (1300 69 7337).
- Talk to our on-call doctor.
- Make a video conference booking, however, if your matter is urgent, the doctor may request to do a video conference immediately.
- Video consults can be done using the Queensland Health TEMSU system in all Queensland Health clinics, or directly with patients in their home via the ZOOM app
- To use ZOOM you need:

A computer with internet, camera, speaker, mic and email access – no software downloads required.



A mobile device (smartphone or tablet) which has an internet connection and a built-in camera, mic speaker.

#### Services covered:

- Telephone consultations
- Video consultations
- Scheduled follow up consultations
- Review emails/ photos/ faxes/ECG's/x-rays etc.
- Use live electronic medical records including My Health Record
- Prescribe medication including use of the RFDS medical chest
- Arrange appropriate higher level care if required – including aeromedical or road retrieval, referral to hospital or appropriate specialists

## Occupational Therapy (Telehealth and Outreach Service) <u>Do you need an Occupational Therapist?</u>

- Do you have trouble using your hands? Is it difficult to open jars/taps, do you have arthritis or a repetitive injury like carpal tunnel syndrome? Is it hard to use your hands as much as normal after a broken hand/wrist?
- Have you had a burn or hand injury that required medical treatment?
- Do you have swollen arms/legs or have a slow healing wound? Do you have a swollen or heavy/achy limb after cancer treatment?
- Do you have trouble getting on and off the toilet, or feel unbalanced when having a shower? Do you need to rock to get off your lounge chair or bed?
- Would you like to trial a shower chair/toilet frame/commode/bed stick to make things easier at home?
- Are you a carer for someone with dementia or a physical impairment? Would you like some tips on how to make it safer to do so?
- Do you find it difficult to see things around the home?
- Have you had falls around the home or are scared of falling?
- Have you had a stroke or a heart attack recently?
- Would you like some rails or a ramp at your home to increase your safety or independence?
- Do you have a pressure sore?
- Are there things you would like to do that you can't due to injury, frailty or illness?

If you've answered yes to any of the above questions, an Occupational Therapist may help!

Please talk to your clinic nurse or RFDS about a referral to the visiting Occupational Therapy service.

#### **Who Can Refer to Occupational Therapy?**

- Parent, carers or individuals
- Doctors hospital or GP's
- Medical specialists
- Other Allied Health eg. Physio, Speech Therapist
- Community nurses
- Community agencies

A doctor's referral is necessary for hand and compression therapy (swollen limbs).

Our service is available for all people need help with:

- Head and spinal injury

The outreach physiotherapist visits Mt Surprise, Einasleigh, Forsayth, Georgetown and Croydon on a 3 day trip about 5 times each year. The dates for Outreach visits for 2019 are as bellow:

FEB 18-20 PT and OT APR 29 – MAY 1 PT and SP

JULY 15-17 PT, OT, and SW

SEPT 16-18 PT and DT NOV 25-27 PT and OT

As a general overview, physiotherapists provide individual assessment and management for a range of conditions including:

- musculoskeletal/sports injuries including fractures and muscle/joint pain
- balance/mobility difficulties
- recovery post surgery
- respiratory conditions including pneumonia, COPD
- paediatric development
- neurological conditions such as stroke, nerve damage, spinal injury
- burns

Physiotherapy treatment generally consists of

- Rehabilitation and facilitation of correct movement patterns
- Exercise prescription
- Manual therapy
- Patient and carer education
- Mobility aid prescription
- Injury prevention
- Pain relief
- Strapping/taping


If you think you may require physiotherapy intervention, please discuss it with the visiting RFDS Doctor or your local Clinic nurse and if indicated, they will send a referral to us to follow up at our next visit. There is also Telehealth available where consults can take place via videoconferencing as appropriate.

## Important changes

## to HOUSEHOLD WASTE COLLECTION in Georgetown

Council seeks your support and help in the continued successful collection of household waste in Georgetown. Residents can help in the ongoing efficient collection of household waste through following a few simple rules:

• Don't over fill your bin as this causes problems in emptying bins with truck mechanism and can also attract birds which pull rubbish out of bins



- Bin lids should be closed properly at all times
- Break up or squash bulky items such as cardboard boxes before putting in bin
- Bins must be placed at kerb or edge of bitumen roadway for collection
- Items on the ground beside the bins will not normally be picked up
- Due to council now permanently using the green garbage truck bins should be placed with pull handles/lid hinge facing the road

**For Georgetown residents** green waste can be deposited at the green waste area at the Georgetown Landfill on the Forsayth Road. In the future, the green waste at the tip will be converted to mulch for use in the town.

#### IMPORTANT CHANGES TO Bank@Post

As many of you would be aware, the major banks have been closing down branches in rural and remote areas for some time now. Australia Post has endeavoured to fill this void by negotiating agreements with them to



provide basic services like deposit, withdrawal and account balance enquiries.

These agreements were due to expire and Australia Post has been negotiating with the four major banks to renew these services into the future. Westpac, CBA and NAB have confirmed their commitment for access to banking services for their customers but ANZ have not come onboard.

As such, we regret to inform **ALL ANZ CUSTOMERS** that Bank@Post services will no longer be available at Australia Post from 14<sup>th</sup> January 2019. However, bill payments with ANZ cards will still be accepted.



#### **CHAPTER ONE - A TARGET BELOW!**

The following story, which was inspired by a persistent rumor of a Japanese fighter plane shot down during the Second World War and discovered many years later on Cape York was considered to be fictional, although recent information to hand has cast some doubt on this, the information being that the wreck was actually recovered and now resides in an unknown museum further south. However, the rest of the story is fictional although place names and those of some people on the Cape are real.

The winter sun sparkled off the blue Pacific Ocean some twenty thousand feet below the Zero as it cruised comfortably at around 250 miles per hour. The morning sun illuminated the countless outcrops of coral far below, which formed part of the Great Barrier Reef.

Pilot Officer Takeo Matsumaro glanced down through the Perspex of the cockpit's canopy at the dense green jungle that stretched for miles off his starboard wing. The vegetation was separated by a line of gleaming white coral sand from the lapping waves of the sea. Glancing up and around the azure blue sky he could see nothing that warranted his attention. Earlier, however, he had encountered a couple of American Hellcat fighters, but after a quick and decisive dogfight, the enemy planes had proven no match to the superior speed of his Ki-61 Hien or Flying Swallow as the new model Zero had been named. The 1175 h.p. Kawasaki-powered fighter was capable of a maximum 348 mph and was highly maneuverable.

Shortly after Takeo and his fellow members of the Air Corps were based on New Britain's southern coast, under the command of the 25th Air Flotilla with its headquarters located in Rabaul.Only recently in February that year in 1942, the Japanese Admiral, Yamamoto, who had previously planned the successful attack on Pearl Harbor had planned an immediate invasion of Australia.

Admiral Yamamoto had only just implemented his bombing raids on Darwin in the Northern Territory.

Now Pilot Officer Takeo Matsumaro cast his mind back to the lectures given to him and his honorable fellow pilots about the plans Admiral Yamamoto had for the invasion of this poorly defended southern continent of Australia. The highly regarded Japanese Imperial Army General, Tomoyuki Yamashita, who had become famous for conquering the British Colonies of Malaya and Singapore and which earned him the nickname of The Tiger of Malava, had been interested in Yamamoto's Invasion Plan and the General had even volunteered to lead the invasion. Takeo shook his head sadly as he reminded himself that the Japanese Prime Minister, General Hideki Tojo had been very opposed to the plan since he had considered that there had been no contingency arrangements for the Invasion. Evidently the Honorable General Tojo was worried that their fleet of ships would be extended to its limit thus allowing the Americans to readily divert their B-17 Flying Fortress bombers to Sydney to destroy the invading forces.

Australia. Looking down at this remote eastern coastline of the Australian State of Queensland, Takeo considered the recent successful raids on the town of Darwin by Japanese bombers from aircraft carriers situated to the north west of Australia. Even though he had been informed that the Honorable Admiral Yamamoto's plan was supposed to be a diversionary invasion one in order to supposedly draw the large American forces away from the Japanese forces to the north, rather than to actually occupy this southern land, Matsumaro considered that any invasion would indeed be a "walk-over." Really, were there any enemy forces in sufficient numbers to stop the invincible Japanese Imperial Military from conquering these round-eyes? He thought not.

Deciding on a whim to proceed south, along northern Australia's eastern coastline Matsumaro began searching for some likely targets. He still had enough ammunition for the wing-mounted 20 mm cannons as well as his two 7.7 machine guns to allow him to attack anything he might come across, particularly any enemy on the ground. The sun's rays pouring into the cockpit over his left shoulder warmed him through his flying jacket. At his present altitude, the warmth was particularly welcome. With a gloved right hand resting lightly on the control column, and a thumb never far away from the firing button, Takeo Matsumaro was itching for more action. He adjusted his goggles with his left hand and peered along the coastline that stretched ahead. Squeezing his eyes against the glare, he looked hard at something that glinted in the sun, a few miles ahead – barely discernible amongst the trees on the shoreline but was quickly becoming more obvious as he approached. It was a white boat at anchor near the shore the sun flashing off the windshield glass as it rocked gently on the water. Glancing at the altimeter Takeo noted his height at a little over 5000 feet – too high, he thought for an effective strike against any possible enemy on the ground. Rapidly losing altitude and keeping a watch on the boat, his eyes expertly searched around and below for any signs of movement. Instinctively beginning his plan of action Matsumaro gently pushed the control column forward putting the Zero into a shallow dive – immediately the plane's speed increased. The object ahead and below quickly grew larger as the Zero approached. Banking to the left for a moment, then to the right, he deftly brought the nose of the plane around and headed toward what appeared to be a couple of small buildings, almost hidden from view by the surrounding jungle. The larger of the two structures sat on the top of a small hill, and even from that height, Takeo could see the rusting patches on the iron roof.

Increasing the angle of the dive, Matsumaro zoomed down to treetop level and roared over the small

house and an adjoining building. Nearby, a small jetty protruded out into the sea, with a motor launch tied at the end, an enemy ensign fluttering from the stern. This was an opportunity not to be missed, thought Takeo, the corners of his eyes creasing slightly, a smile playing around the corners of his mouth as he peered down at this easy, soft target.

Hauling gently back on the controls, Matsumaro put the Zero into a steep climb before leveling out to bank sharply to the left. Looking over his shoulder as he throttled his speed back, he could see a number of people running from the buildings. A slight smile played around the corner of his lips as he flicked the switch from the cannon to the machine guns mounted above the engine. With a little right rudder and a touch on the control column to the right, he positioned the aircraft back towards his intended target. Dropping the plane's nose, the buildings loomed into view through the windshield. His thumb pressed the firing button and the twin machine guns in the plane's nose, spewed their lethal messengers of death, kicking up small fountains of dirt as they raced towards the larger building. In a split second, it had gone from view as the Zero, pulling out of its shallow dive, howled across the small jetty, coconut treetops flashing past his cockpit. The white launch tied to the jetty, rocked gently as the aircraft headed out across the sea.

Matsumaro banked steeply to starboard, and headed back towards the shore, throttling the motor back at the same time. The plane's speed dropped accordingly, and the pilot craned his neck over his right shoulder as he flew back across his target in an endeavor to assess the damage. Before putting the plane into a steep bank, Matsumaro quickly took in the scene below. Apart from a small column of smoke that rose from the larger building, and a bullet-riddled roof, the damage seemed rather minimal, he thought, straightening the Zero as he flew low past the house. He didn't notice a figure, near the building, aiming something towards the plane. Glancing at his fuel gauge, he automatically made some rapid calculations before he proceeded to gain altitude, at the same time switching to the two 20mm cannons. One last pass and he'd deliver his coup de grace before heading back to his base in New Guinea across the Torres Strait. This time he would destroy the launch at the jetty with cannon fire as well, ensuring total destruction of the enemy base.

A split second before he began to ease the control column back, Takeo Matsumaro felt his aircraft judder slightly. Suddenly, across his starboard wing, bullet holes appeared, their edges flowering upwards across the aluminum. A bullet ricocheted through the cockpit, narrowly missing his legs, to hit the port side of the Perspex canopy, which immediately cracked around a jagged hole. Matsumaro knew instantly his plane was being fired on from below – and already a small stream of smoke had started to pour from the engine, inducing Takeo to change his mind and immediately head northwards back to base.

Quickly the Japanese pilot looked up and around, his keen brown eyes searching the clear blue sky, but there were no other aircraft about. He was safe from attack there. Ha! He had been shot at from below.

He hadn't anticipated being fired at by the enemy 'round-eyes,' believing his surprise attack would have eliminated any opposition. Now, however, he had other things with which to occupy his mind. He cast an expert eye over the plane's instrument panel, noticing with some concern that already the oil pressure had begun to drop. The fuel gauge reading was fine, and quickly he calculated he had enough gasoline to get him home, but obviously, this was not going to be his problem. Throttling back slightly in order to keep his engine revs down, he glanced at the altimeter.... a little under one hundred feet. At this altitude he would be hard pressed to use his parachute, he thought. On an impulse, Takeo reversed his decision, and gently increased the throttle in an attempt to gain enough altitude to permit him to eject and safely employ his parachute. However, this action caused the stream of smoke to increase from the now roughly-running engine and together with the rapidly dropping oil pressure, put paid to his intention of trying to reach his base. Obviously he was now in

big trouble! With a final glance at the instrument panel, Matsumaro quickly decided his course of action... maybe if he followed the beach he might find a suitable place to bring his beloved Zero down for a crash landing.

Takeo looked down at the small strip of sand below. His gaze followed the coast line, taking in all the details. The tide was apparently in, which didn't leave much in the way of a suitable place on which to crash-land his plane. Above the high water mark, there were what looked to be large sand dunes. Here and there, the jungle had receded back from the beach, but in its place were mangrove-lined creeks, uninviting to say the least. Wondering vaguely if crocodiles were as bad here as in the rivers of New Guinea, his attention returned rapidly back to the instruments in front of him as a subtle change in the noise of the motor warned him of impending trouble. As the aircraft's speed decreased, so did its altitude. Takeo, realizing that he had to prepare for the worst, began searching frantically for a suitable place to put down his crippled Zero when the motor suddenly spluttered, and seized.

Less than a mile ahead, a wide patch of sand dunes appeared, and instinctively, Matsumaro headed towards it, pushing the control column forward to put the fighter into a nose-down attitude in order to maintain flying speed. With the engine now silent, the airman could hear the air as it whistled through the hole in the cockpit floor and the canopy. The controls felt sluggish as he struggled with them, trying desperately to keep the powerless aircraft flying. Now with the small stretch of beach rapidly looming towards him, Takeo extended the flaps fully, reducing speed, hauling back on the stick at the same time in an attempt to stall the plane and pancake into the soft sand just above the high water mark. Bracing himself for the inevitable impact, he was thrown hard against his harness as the plane, bouncing violently, buried itself into the sand, which billowed high into the air, carrying with it driftwood and other debris, to shower back over the thin metal fuselage. The lightlybuilt plane was not designed for such treatment and as the aircraft buried its nose into the sand, the port-side wing sheared off when it connected the base of a small stand of coconut trees. The starboard wing folded back with the impact, while the from the fuselage a hideous sound of screeching and tearing as it plowed into violent contact with the ground until the engine nacelle hit a large log half-buried in the sand, arresting the progress of the disintegrating plane with one immense crash. The last thing Pilot Officer Takeo Matsumaro remembered was the sand dunes rushing to greet him with frightening speed – then a quiet enveloping blackness swept over him....

# Recipe of the Month

# Mango Meringue Bites

#### **INGREDIENTS**

- 2 small ripe mangoes, peeled, chopped
- 2 tablespoons caster sugar, plus 3/4 cup extra
- 2 tablespoons lime juice

- 2 egg yolks
- 75g butter, chopped
- 24 mini tart shells
- 3 egg whites



#### **METHOD**

Step 1: Blend or process mango, sugar and lime juice until smooth.

Transfer to a medium saucepan. Whisk in egg yolks. Place over medium-low heat. Stir constantly for 6 to 8 minutes or until mixture thickens and coats the back of a spoon. Remove from heat. Add butter, one piece at a time, whisking until combined.

Cool for 5 minutes. Place tart shells on a large baking tray. Divide curd among tart shells. Refrigerate for 3 hours.

Step 2: Preheat grill to high. Using an electric mixer, whisk egg whites until soft peaks form. Gradually add extra sugar, 1 tablespoon at a time, until firm peaks form. Place meringue in a piping bag fitted with a 1cm fluted nozzle. Pipe meringue onto pies. Place under grill for 2 minutes or until tops are lightly browned. Serve.
