## MESSAGE FROM THE MAYOR

Hello and welcome to the Mayor's report



I would like to start the March report off by saying a huge thank you for the support that has been forthcoming throughout the Local Government Election period.

It has been humbling and pleasing at the same time to be given the approval to represent the Shire and lead Council over the next four years.

Looking back over the challenging times experienced by the previous Council I need to acknowledge the commitment and dedication of all the Councillors that served admirably with the greatest respect for their position and decorum at the forefront when in discussion. Thank you all for being a part of a cohesive and constructive Council.

With the 2024 Council Election results imminent, there is preparation underway for training and information programs to be delivered to the incoming Councillors.

Swearing in and formal recognition of positions will take place on the morning of the 28th March followed by a statutory meeting.

Once again our road network has copped a hammering from a fairly intense and prolonged wet season. Emergent works are being carried out when and where conditions allow and will be the case for some time to come, as moisture levels remain high across the Shire.

Project Managers Shepherd's have advised Council that data collection is very near to completion and submissions will be delivered to QRA for Flood Damage assessment and consideration in the very near future.

Weather conditions have stifled our attempts to progress the start of the TIDS project on the Forsayth - Einasleigh Road. A further ten kilometres will be sealed under that project bringing to completion the sealing of this 72 kilometres stretch of road.

Our main arterial roads are currently receiving treatment in preparation for the Easter influx of visitation to the Shire. Opening grades to properties will commence as conditions allow.

Easter is fast approaching and I take this opportunity to acknowledge the fantastic work that is carried out organising and holding events across the Shire.

A big shout out to the gardening crew and town maintenance staff in all our communities who are fighting the good fight keeping up with mowing and keeping places presentable in a year like we are having. No easy task but we recognise the great work being carried out.

Do not forget Australia Day is being celebrated in Einasleigh on the 6th of April, we would love to see you there.

ANZAC Day will be upon us before you know it and Council is already organising ceremonies in our communities to take place on the 25th April 2024.

Thank you to CEO Ken Timms for holding the fort while Council was in caretaker mode due to the Local Government Elections. This is always a bit of a tricky time with restrictions on what Council can and cannot do especially concerning decisions over a certain financial threshold.

Enjoy the upcoming Easter weekend, stay safe.





Etheridge Shire Council has activated for Disaster Recovery Funding Arrangements (Category B). The following assistance is currently available to Etheridge Shire residents to assist with personal, business and primary production damage and loss.



#### **Business Queensland**

#### Report damage to your farm

Report any damages or losses to your farm through the disaster impact survey. These reports help determine if you will need extra support during recovery. You need to include date-stamped photos, which most mobile phone cameras do automatically.



Primary producers in <u>eligible local government</u> areas may be able to access:

- · Financial support through the QRIDA
- Freight subsidies of up to \$5,000 per property to move essential materials such as fodder, building and fencing materials, machinery, and animals for restocking
- Emergency hardship assistance grants.

If you have suffered significant damage or flooding from Ex-Tropical Cyclone Kirrily but you aren't in a disaster activated area, you can apply for the individual disaster stricken property (IDSP) declaration.

Affected smaller scale producers and agriculture supply chain businesses can access <u>small business support</u>.

#### **Activity notice**

### Georgetown AEM survey

Geoscience Australia, in collaboration with the Geological Survey of Queensland, will be carrying out an Airborne Electromagnetic (AEM) survey with 2 km line spacing in the Georgetown/Croydon area from June to July 2024. The survey is part of a larger geophysical survey program that aims to gather new information about the potential ground water, mineral and energy resources concealed beneath the surface. This information will lead to more informed resource management and to better targeted investment.

#### Why is this survey important?

This survey is being carried out to obtain data that will enhance understanding of geology and natural resources of the region. This information will support future informed decision making for resource management.

#### Survey Method

Light aircraft are fitted with instruments to map variations in the natural electrical conductivity of the ground to a depth of several hundred metres.

During the survey, a signal will be transmitted from the aircraft into the ground. The signal is similar to that produced by a power line, passing quickly as the aircraft moves. Towed antennae can detect the returned signals. The nature of these signals are analysed to map variations in the electrical conductivity of the ground caused by the presence of groundwater and some minerals.



### **Georgetown Airborne Gravity Survey**

Geoscience Australia in collaboration with the Geological Survey of Queensland will be conducting an airborne geophysical (gravity) survey in central Queensland between April and July 2024. The regional airborne gravity survey will provide a new generation of data to improve the definition of gravimetric anomalies in the region. In addition, the survey will provide better understanding of the cover sequence thickness and structural trends of the underlying basement geology. Precompetitive geophysics is an effective way to both attract new explorers to an area and stimulate exploration by existing resource authority holders.

#### Survey Method

A light aircraft will be fitted with instruments called gravimeters that measure extremely small variations in the Earth's natural gravity field.

The aircraft flights lines are planned to be flown in an east-west direction 1 kilometre apart. The instruments do not emit any signals during the survey, and there are no impacts to people or animals aside from a brief noise disturbance.

#### What you may see or hear

A small aeroplane (Cessna) will fly at about 100 metres above the ground during the survey. The pilot will alter flight lines to avoid buildings and infrastructure and increase the height to around 450 metres around built up areas.

The noise produced by the aircraft is similar to a backyard lawnmower and will last about 30 seconds as the plane passes over.




Figure 2: Location of Survey Area.

The current indoor waiting area will be transformed later in the year to a reception area which will enable a larger office area for the nurses in the current reception space.

We expect these changes will allow better patient flow and more efficient layout for nurses and Doctors during heavy workflow periods. We look forward to improving the facility to meet your needs.

#### Exciting changes to our health care delivery: an update

Thank you to the Director of Nursing from Forsayth Narelle Murphy who is now regularly coming to Georgetown Health centre each Tuesday morning to provide assistance to Jas and I with patient care.

This initiative has been in the discussion phase for a few months as we had identified a higher need for nursing support to our facility. We have been going for 3 weeks now and we can see this as a positive change and are getting good feedback from patients. Please join us in welcoming Narelle to our facility.





#### **Changes to contacting the health centre**

Due to a high demand of calls coming in on weekends and morning prior to opening we have changed the hours to contacting the landline to business hours only. As there are no support staff to pick up these calls and the nurse is working solo this was necessary to change. Therefore you can contact us on our landline from 9-4 weekdays and 10-12 weekends/public holidays.

There are no other changes to contacting the clinic, including for emergencies.



#### Remote Area Families Service (RAFS) Factsheet

#### About RAFS and what it provides

The Remote Area Families Service is an Early Childhood program designed to support children and families in rural and remote Queensland and the Barkly Tablelands of the Northern Territory, who live beyond the reach on mainstream services. Our service aims to support parents' needs in relation to the early childhood development and education of their children in rural, remote and isolated areas. The focus of the service is directed at all families with children aged birth to 5 years regardless of their cultural or religious background.

RAFS operates throughout QLD from five bases:

- Charleville
- Emerald (based in Mackay)
- Mt Isa
- North Queensland (based in Mareeba)

<u>Please Note:</u> We do not provide a babysitting service during any of our events. RAFS staff are unable to take sole responsibility of children during the play sessions.

#### Ways to access the service

The early childhood program targets children aged from birth to five years; however, if older siblings wish to participate they are most welcome. The experiences that are planned for the birth to five year old children are play based and use the Early Years Learning Framework as a point of reference. The team will aim to be a consistent presence in the families and children's lives through a variety of ways. Families can contact the RAFS team and request face-to-face contact any time during the year.

#### **Playgroups**

RAFS playgroups are an excellent opportunity for families to come together and experience a wide variety of early learning activities. Playgroup allows children to play in a relaxed, informal setting, where they can interact with other children, make choices, explore, share ideas and learn to work cooperatively and independently.

#### **Home Visits**

Home visits, as the name suggests, are when a RAFS team visits a family, in their home, at a mutually suitable time. A home visit differs significantly from a playgroup. Spending one on one time with children is an opportunity for the FAFS team to tailor the program exclusively to each child. Sharing time with the whole family, being able to let children take the lead in showing the RAFS team their home, is wonderful for self-esteem and confidence building. Home visits will normally take the form of either a morning or afternoon/overnight visit.



#### **Events**

At times RAFS may be able to attend Community group or organization events outside the UnitingCare Network. Examples include the Royal Flying Doctor Service and School of Distance Education. We do require a written invitation to attend these events, please contact your local RAFS team for more information.

RAFS teams offer guidance and support in the area of early childhood development and parenting by training and/or experienced field staff. This can be done through:

- Newsletters

Our Seniors Legal & Support Service is part of ADA Australia, an advocacy organisation and registered Queensland Community Legal service (ADA Law).


#### How do we work?



## Historical Stories

## 1956 FLOOD

We would like to share some memories that our Dad, Robert McFarlane told some time ago of his brother Bill, our Uncle Bill McFarlane

Thank you Colleen Henry for sharing these stories



In March at the time of the 1956 floods that hit Georgetown, Robert was 19 years old and Bill probably 21 years, they were camped at Langlovale, working. There had been a fair bit of rain around for about a week. They ran out of tucker (food) so they decided to head out, roughly about 35km to the family home.

Home being at the old place that is still standing today on the bank of the Gilbert River on the old Croydon Road down from the Gilbert Bridge. They started out on horseback, everything was full of water, the hollows were full and the Langlo was flooded out over its banks, so they turned back. The next day they set off again, when they got to the Langlo River it was still a big swim but the river had dropped back in the banks.

As soon as Bill jumped his horse in he called for Robert to follow. Robert didn't notice Bill's horse not coming up, as the fast running river had washed them downstream. Bill was on a saddled horse and Robert was bareback. Bill Managed to hold onto the reigns while being washed 200m downstream until he could grab hold of a tree.

Bill called out to Robert that his horse is drowning and to tie his horse up and swim back over to help him. Robert swam back and helped pull the saddle and bridle off the horse and tied them up in a tree to retrieve later.

The horse Bill was riding, an old hollow back brumby called Swampy, was known to be a good swimmer, as Sam Owens an old Aboriginal man used to swim with old Swampy over the Gilbert River if they were in need of something.

# 1956 FLOOD

They continued on from the Langlo River to the Anna branch, taking turns, one riding the horse and one walking. They let the horse go at the Anna branch, swam over it and walked on a couple more kilometres to the Gilbert Bridge.

At the time the bridge wasn't built but under construction and all the camps for the workers and their families were on the other side. By this time it was getting late in the day and they decided to wait there hoping someone would hear or see them.

If no-one noticed them they would swim over the Gilbert River on a log and come out at their home before it got dark. Bill said if they didn't swim, they would be eaten by mosquitoes.

Lucky for them Glen Steele did hear them and went over in the boat to pick them up. He then drove them to the water course at the Gilbert River Race Track on the Strathmore road. They walked the water course and the last 2km home to reach the house safely. Robert said Bill was a good horseman and could ride a rough horse.

One time Robert remembers there was a fire at Langlovale, they went out to check the fire, driving through the bush in an old A model Ford they hit a gully, and the fire burnt their car. As they walked back home they both caught a horse and rock back out. The fire was coming down the hollow, Robert said he and Bill had to go flat gallop on their horses to stay in the lead of it until they got in the clear.

Phil Johns recalls Big Bill (Bill great McFarlane), was а horseman and could ride with the best rough riders on any station. Bill was riding this horse one morning and the horse was looking sideways at the boots Bill was wearing. Bill said to the horse, I'll give you something to look at, gets off and breaks off two branches and hook one in each stirrup iron and mounts up again. Bill was always in control. Phil said when working at the Gilbert when they were building the Gilbert River Bridge, Bill and Bronnie would pick all the young ones up and take them into the dances in Georgetown.



#### **Be Battery Disposal Aware**

- Tape used battery terminals with clear sticky tape
- Take used batteries to a B-cycle Drop-off point.

#### Grants to support community resilience

Gulf Savannah NRM is launching the next round of its Community Resilience Grants program.







- Refilling a damaged or out-of-date gas bottle is illegal and can be dangerous or anyone in the vicinity of the cylinder.

Gas bottles have a date stamp applied during manufacture. It is usually in the metal collar (as pictured) but can be on the base. It may also include the maker's brand and country. The date normally comprises the month and last 2 digits of the year. There may also be a re-test date. Some bottles have several retest dates.

Still not sure? Drop in and ask Dave to have a look at the cylinder.




