#### **MESSAGE FROM THE MAYOR**

Good Day to all

I can't believe we are staring down the month of May already.

What's Council up to?

Council is in the planning stage of developing additional ruralresidential allotments along the Georgetown – Forsayth Road with allotment sizes ranging from 2ha's to 7ha

Furthermore, Council has requested the CEO to provide Council with a concept plan for sub-dividing another lot of land also along the Georgetown-Forsayth Road at the southern end of Haldane street that will be suitable for units specifically designed for the elderly or disabled.

Council is also in the planning stage of developing a Council Depot in Einasleigh. Council conducted a workshop on Wednesday 24th April to discuss this concept and has requested the CEO to write to the Department of Natural Resources Mines & Energy regarding available land within the township suitable to accommodate a Depot operation.

#### **Projects**

The construction of the Multi-Purpose Sports complex has commenced and is still on target to be completed by the end of the financial year. Over the coming weeks the portal frames will be delivered and installed. This complex once finished will be a great asset for the shire.

The month of May will finally see contractors moving in to commence construction on the Charleston Dam. This will be a welcome sight! Not only for our community but also for Council.

Council's road construction crew(s) will be commencing approximately 4km of new pavement to the Forsayth – Einasleigh road. The section of upgrade will start from the end of the Bitumen just past Flags Lookout heading back towards Forsayth. This work is being funded through the Roads to Recovery Program and the State Governments TIDS program. Work on this section of Council's road network will be commencing from 27th April 2019 through to the 30th June 2019.

For some time now Council has been discussing the opportunity to create permanent positions within Parks & Gardens in the townships of Mt Surprise, Forsayth & Einasleigh. This is something that will create permanent positions in these townships giving job security whilst further enhancing the beauty of our smaller towns.



#### **2018|2019 AMENDED BUDGET**

Council considers that its Budget is a fundamental instrument of accountability and an essential strategic document to ensure that the objectives under Council's Corporate Plan are implemented over the five (5) years. The 2018/2019 Budget has been developed within Councils overall planning framework.

It is good financial stewardship to review the Annual Budget in depth at regular intervals to ensure that what Revenue was forecasted is still likely to be achieved and that the Operating and Capital expenditure is in line with original costs estimates and also to make any amendments to either the Revenue and Expenditure streams.

In addition, Council may, by resolution, amend the budget for a financial year at any time before the end of the financial year, however if the Budget does not comply with S.169 of the Local Government Regulation 2012 when it is amended, the amendment of the budget is of no effect.

#### **Summary**

Over the past nine (9) months Council's Budget has been subject to additions to Capital Expenditure, and also subject to the reduction in Grant funded project. Therefore, it is timely to undertake a review of the 2018/19 Budget to make the necessary amendments to reflect a more accurate account of Revenue Streams and Expenditure. At the April 2019 General Meeting, Council resolved the following:

Acknowledges that the 2018/2019 Amended Budget reveals total revenue from ordinary activities amounting to \$24,056.005, total expenses from ordinary activities (including depreciation) amounting to \$26,983,619 and capital funding operations amounting to \$12,826,956 and furthermore that Council Resolve pursuant to section 170(3) of the Local Government Act 2009 and sections 169 of the Local Government Regulation 2012, to amend Council's Budget for the 2018/2019 financial year, incorporating:

- i. The statements of financial position;
- ii. The statements of cash flow;
- iii. The statements of income and expenditure;
- iv. The statements of changes in equity;

The main expense item that has had amendments to it is within Materials & Services. This has had an increase in expenditure due to NDRRA Flood works and also the additional contract for the Hann Highway project. The majority of expenditure items within the original 2018/19 Budget have remained consistent with the amended 2018/19 Budget.

- Councils Operating Surplus / (Deficit) has been reduced from (\$2.306M) to (\$0.180M) which takes into consideration the adding back of the prepaid FAGs grant.
- Council's cash position decreases from \$12.483M to \$11.858M (\$0.625M). The cash position is still sufficient to cash back Councils Capital Reserves which as at 30/6/19 is estimated to be \$9.45M
- Councils Capital Expenditure has been reduced from \$16.489M to \$12.826M.
  The reduction is due to a number of projects that were identified within the
  original Budget which were dependent and reliant upon Grant Applications
  through either the State & Federal Governments or through Council's
  resolutions over the past 9 months to defer the capital project or capital
  acquisition. In addition the Capital Revenue has also decreased from \$10.935M
  to \$7.592M.


#### MINING ACTIVITIES

You may be or may not be aware of a new Mining Lease that was approved by the Mines Department in February 2019 for Laneway Resources which is situated at Agate Creek. This new mine has now commenced operating within the Etheridge Shire. The Mine is located along the Agate Creek Road. (Refer to the Map below).

The Mine is owned by Laneway Resources and is being managed by Maroon Gold. From the meetings that Council has conducted with this firm, the 1<sup>st</sup> phase of their mining operation will be ongoing for approximately 4-5 months. This means that the Mine will be hauling ore along the Agate Creek Road using B-Double configurations with approximately 12-14 truck movements per day.

This ore is transported from the Mine Site along the Agate Creek Road, along the Georgetown-Forsayth Road with the ore then being stockpiled at the old Mining processing plant just south of Georgetown. The ore is then loaded onto Triple's and hauled from the old mine processing plant via the internal haul road which intersects with the Gulf Developmental Road. From here the ore is transported along the Gulf Developmental Road, down the Kennedy Highway and then onto the Gregory Developmental Road to Charters Towers for processing.

Council would like to take this opportunity to advise the community to take care if you are travelling along the Agate Creek Road, Georgetown-Forsayth Road, Gulf Developmental Road, Kennedy Highway and the Gregory Developmental Road as there will be an increase in road activity.

#### **EMPLOYMENT MATTERS**

Council is in the recruitment process for a new Director of Engineering. This position has been vacant since March 2018, and Council has been unsuccessful to date in recruiting for this position. Council has engaged a recruitment firm to assist Council in this process. The closing date for this position is the 10<sup>th</sup> May.

In addition, Council has advertised for the role of Workplace Health & Safety Advisor, with the closing date being 6<sup>th</sup> May.

#### **BUDGET 2019/2020**

I am in the process of preparing the Draft 2019/20 Budget for Council which is developed in accordance with Councils 5 year Corporate Plan regarding projects and services.

In addition, Council has been revalued to take effect from 1 July 2019. The valuation changes have not been consistent within and between land use types. This is however fairly typical in revaluations across the State.

This is not an uncommon situation for a council to face following a revaluation, and while most councils seek to minimise the fluctuations in increases, it is technically not possible (lawfully) to achieve an even change in rate levies.

Grazing properties experienced an overall increase of 47%.

- 8 properties (7%) increase between 10-19%
- 19 properties (15%) increase between 20-29%
- 21 properties (17%) increase between 30-39%
- 75 properties (61%) increase above 40%

Section 74(1) of the Local Government Regulation 2012 states that a Local Government must calculate the rates for land by using the rateable value of the land

Council will work through these issues when developing its Rating Categories and Methodology for the 2019/20 Budget. This is not the first time that Council has been subjected to inconsistent values within land use types.

It is envisaged that Council will hold its first Budget work shop within the next two weeks and hold subsequent workshops to have the Budget finalised and adopted within the legislative period being on or before the 31<sup>st</sup> July.

Council seeks your support and help in the continued successful collection of household waste in Georgetown. Residents can help in the ongoing efficient collection of household waste through following a few simple rules:

- Don't over fill your bin as this causes problems in emptying bins with truck mechanism and can also attract birds which pull rubbish out of bins
- Bin lids should be closed properly at all times
- Break up or squash bulky items such as cardboard boxes before putting in bin
- Bins must be placed at kerb or edge of bitumen roadway for collection
- Items on the ground beside the bins will not normally be picked up
- Due to council now permanently using the green garbage truck bins should be placed with pull handles/lid hinge facing the road

**For Georgetown residents** green waste can be deposited at the green waste area at the Georgetown Landfill on the Forsayth Road. In the future, the green waste at the tip will be converted to mulch for use in the town.

## OUTREACH PHYSIOTHERAPY

The outreach physiotherapist visits Mt Surprise, Einasleigh, Forsayth, Georgetown and Croydon on a 3-day trip about 5 times each year.

As a general overview, physiotherapists provide individual assessment and management for a range of conditions including:

- musculoskeletal/sports injuries including fractures and muscle/joint pain
- balance/mobility difficulties
- recovery post surgery
- respiratory conditions including pneumonia, COPD
- paediatric development
- neurological conditions such as stroke, nerve damage, spinal injury
- burns

Physiotherapy treatment generally consists of:

- Rehabilitation and facilitation of correct movement patterns
- Exercise prescription
- Manual therapy
- Patient and carer education
- Mobility aid prescription
- Injury prevention
- Pain relief
- Strapping/taping

If you think you may require physiotherapy intervention, please discuss it with the visiting RFDS Doctor or your local Clinic nurse and if indicated, they will send a referral to us to follow up at our next visit. There is also Telehealth available where consults can take place via videoconferencing as appropriate.

### Occupational Therapy (Telehealth and Outreach Service) Do you need an Occupational Therapist?

- Do you have trouble using your hands? Is it difficult to open jars/taps, do you have arthritis
  or a repetitive injury like carpal tunnel syndrome? Is it hard to use your hands as much as
  normal after a broken hand/wrist?
- Have you had a burn or hand injury that required medical treatment?
- Do you have swollen arms/legs or have a slow healing wound? Do you have a swollen or heavy/achy limb after cancer treatment?
- Do you have trouble getting on and off the toilet, or feel unbalanced when having a shower? Do you need to rock to get off your lounge chair or bed?
- Would you like to trial a shower chair/toilet frame/commode/bed stick to make things easier at home?



The intrepid traveler, wanting to proceed further north from the turnoff to Weipa and onto Bamaga near the tip of the Cape, the mainland of Australia's most northerly point, is faced with two alternatives by road, either to tackle the old Telegraph Track or travel via the relatively new by-pass track.

If you are ringing into the clinic and the phone is not answered quickly please stay on the line and your call will either be redirected to the clinic mobile phone or to the message bank.

If you have an emergency and cannot contact the nurse please call either the

RFDS 40400500 or 000 - Ambulance for advice.

A sign will be on the front door if the clinic nurse is on fatigue leave or out of the clinic attending to an emergency.

#### The Clinic needs more Volunteer Ambulance Drivers.

What you need-

- 1. A current driver's licence.
- 2. A willingness to be 'on call' overnight and weekends.
- 3. A reasonable level of fitness as you will need to help carry equipment and assist with the stretcher.
- 4. A good local knowledge of properties and roads.
- 5. While 'on call' you cannot drink Alcohol. It is a requirement from QAS.
- 6. The Nurse will give an orientation to the Ambulance including how to use the stretcher and the Radio.

By volunteering you will help support the local nurses who provide emergency response care to the community and visitors to this area. You will also help increase the numbers

of our regular volunteers and reduce the amount of times that you are all asked to be available to drive.

The Royal Flying Doctor Service Cairns Base is now providing extended telehealth services for people living in North Queensland.

On Saturdays and Sundays from 8:00 am to 5:30 pm the Cairns Base will now have a dedicated second doctor based in the office to provide phone and video consultations, with access to electronic medical records.

#### To contact the weekend telehealth service:

- Call the RFDS Medical line on 07 4040 0500 or 1300MYRFDS (1300 69 7337).
- · Talk to our on-call doctor.
- Make a video conference booking, however, if your matter is urgent, the doctor may request to do a video conference immediately.
- Video consults can be done using the Queensland Health TEMSU system in all Queensland Health clinics, or directly with patients in their home via the ZOOM app
- To use ZOOM you need:

A computer with internet, camera, speaker, mic and email access – no software downloads required.



A mobile device (smartphone or tablet) which has an internet connection and a built-in camera, mic speaker.

#### Services covered:

- Telephone consultations
- Video consultations
- Scheduled follow up consultations
- Review emails/ photos/ faxes/ECG's/x-rays etc.
- Use live electronic medical records including My Health Record
- Prescribe medication including use of the RFDS medical chest
- Arrange appropriate higher level care if required – including aeromedical or road retrieval, referral to hospital or appropriate specialists


