FROM THE CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER DESK

FINANCIAL UPDATE 2018/19

The financial year has come and gone and we are now almost 1 month into the new 2019/20 financial year.

As at the 30th June 2019, Council's total revenue from ordinary activities amounted to \$25.970M, total expenses from ordinary activities (including depreciation) amounting to \$22.981M and capital funding received amounted to \$1.791M.

Council completed \$6.450M in Capital works during the financial year.

Council will be reporting an Operating Surplus of \$2.989M with a Net result of \$3.419M.

This is another display of good financial stewardship for the 2018/19 financial year from both Management and Councillors.


AUDIT 2018/19

Council's Finance Team is busy preparing Council's financial statements for the 2018/19 financial year, with a comprehensive set of financial statements being presented to Council at the August General Meeting for endorsement prior to issuing the statements to Council's External Auditor.

Council's external auditor will be on-site during the week commencing 26th August to undertake the final audit of Council for the 2018/19 financial year.

MINING ACTIVITIES

As mentioned in previous editions of the Inform, Council would like to remind everyone to take care if you are travelling Creek along the Agate Road. Georgetown-Forsayth Road. Gulf Developmental Road, Kennedy Highway and the Gregory Developmental Road as there will be an increase in road activity, due to the Mining activity occurring at Agate Creek.





ANNUAL FOOD LICENCE RENEWAL

Council has issued its annual food renewal licences to all food retailers within the Shire. It is planned for Council's consulting Food Inspector to be on-site over the coming weeks to conduct inspections.

NEW DEVELOPMENT APPROVAL

At the July General Meeting, Council approved a Development Application for the Ewamian Aboriginal Corporation for a Material Change of Use (Impact Assessment) for Tourism (Major) for Talaroo Hot Springs.

The application was acknowledged by Council on the 7th May 2019 and issued a "Confirmation Notice" to the applicant.

The application is seeking development approval for re-establishing a tourist development focused on the existing Hot Springs on land at Talaroo Station, Talaroo.

The hot springs are an important cultural site to the Ewamian People, a unique environmental asset, and a strategic tourism asset to the Savannah Way, Far North Queensland, Etheridge Shire and the broader community.

The reopening of this tourism experience, with the associated accommodation and facilities, promotes tourism diversity and economic development in the region and compliments the offering of nearby operators, including the Undara Lava Tubes (Undara Outback Adventure). The springs natural, cultural and economic values are of local, state and national significance. This proposal will also provide infrastructure that contributes to the protection of the hot springs.

The Decision Notice which was issued for a Material Change of Use – (Impact Assessment) for Tourism (Major) Talaroo Hotsprings, Talaroo Station was for the purpose of:

- 35 unpowered camping sites;
- 50 powered camping/caravan sites (25 initially with a further 25 dependent on demand);
- 10 glamping sites (luxury cabins) (5 initially with a further 5 dependent on demand);
- Hub Welcome centre, with ticketing, café, kitchen, amenities and retail space, pool and hot and cold spas, yarning circle;
- Staff accommodation, communal kitchen with yarning circle, amenities and showers block;
- Ability to operate cultural gatherings/festivals/events;
- Ancillary facilities including new boardwalks throughout the site, interpretive displays

and information/signage, public art, new private internal road, set down areas, parking areas etc;

• Wellness Centre (longer term)

Council sincerely wishes the Ewamian Aboriginal Corporation all the very best with this Development and Council looks forward to seeing the vision of the Corporation become reality over the coming year.

BUILDING & PLUMBING WORKS

Over the past month I have been inundated with questions and complaints regarding Building & Plumbing works.

If you are thinking about undertaking any building works either renovating, extensions to existing buildings or new building works, it is more than likely that you will be required to lodge a Building application prior to commencing any associated works.

Council can assist you with your questions; however you will need to engage a "Private Building Certifier" to undertake the assessment, approval and inspections (as & when required).

In relation to plumbing works, Council's plumber, Mr Terry O'Connell can assist you with any questions that you may have in relation to plumbing related works and in addition Council can also approve your Plumbing Application.

It can become complicated if you undertake the Building & Plumbing works first then seek approval later, as you may find that you have undertaken non-compliant works in accordance with the relevant Building & Plumbing legislation and the associated codes. This could be costly if you need to alter or replace what you have already constructed.

HANN HIGHWAY PROJECT

Stage 3 has commenced.

- Side track construction has been completed and approved for use. Side track now in use.
- The majority of the bulk excavation has been completed and the formation of the subgrade has commenced.
- Council has arranged quotes for the seal of Stage 3 and it is envisaged that Council will be sealing this section within the next month.

Council has been officially notified that by the Department of Transport & Main Roads that Councils submission for stage 4 of the Hann Highway Project has been accepted for another 4km's. Council has until the 31st December to complete Stage 4.

PROJECTS

The Multi-Purpose Sports Complex is nearing completion with Council negotiating with the Contractors to undertake some minor alterations and improvements to the facility. There is still works to be completed in the Multi-Purpose room, Gym & Squash Court.

The outdoor playing area surface has been laid, with line marking completed. The bowling green is completed except for the ditches, which require further works.

The project is a slightly behind the estimated time schedule, however the positive news is that the building is within the approved Budget.

WATER SUPPLY GEORGETOWN

BASE LEVEL 1 RESTRICTIONS

The level of water in Well 1 in the Etheridge River has fallen to more than 1 meter below full. Under Etheridge Shire Council's current Drought Management Plan this level is a trigger point for a reduction in restriction of water usage. *Level 1 restriction* will now apply to all water connections within the Georgetown Water Supply Scheme.

Notice is hereby given of water restrictions in accordance with the Local Government Act and the Water Act 2002 Section 388(1) Restricting water supply

The following restrictions are effective from midnight on Sunday 19 May 2019


ZONE A

- 1. The use of two (2) sprinklers or soaker hoses is permitted on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays between 5.00 a.m. to 8.00 a.m. and 5.00 p.m. to 8.00 p.m. only.
- 2. The use of micro irrigation systems fitted with timers is permitted on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays between 7.00 p.m. to 8.00 a.m. (ie from 7:00 pm on Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday night)

ZONE B

- 1. The use of two (2) sprinklers or soaker hoses is permitted on Wednesdays, Fridays and Sundays between 5.00 a.m. to 8.00 a.m. and 5.00 p.m. to 8.00 p.m. only.
- 2. The use of micro irrigation systems fitted with timers is permitted on Wednesdays, Fridays and Sundays between 7.00 p.m. to 8.00 a.m. (ie from 7:00 pm on Wednesday, Friday and Sunday night)
 - The use of evaporative cooler/air conditioners is permitted at all times.
 - Use of one (1) only hand held hose is permitted at all times. The nozzle end of hoses, which are not being used in the prescribed manner, shall be placed adjacent to the tap. The hose is to be coiled adjacent the tap, when not under hand held use.

Breaches of these restrictions may result in a penalty.



WATER SUPPLY FORSAYTH

BASE LEVEL 0 RESTRICTIONS

Base level 0 restrictions will now apply to all water connections within the Forsayth Water Supply Scheme.

Notice is hereby given of water restrictions in accordance with the Local Government Act and the Water Act 2002 Section 388(1) Restricting water supply

- 1. No sprinklers on Mondays.
- 2. Sprinklers allowed Tuesday to Sunday between the hours of 5.00 a.m. to 8.00 a.m. and 5.00 p.m. to 8.00 p.m.
- 3. Attended hand held hoses permitted at any time except Mondays.

(Watering permitted 36 hrs per week)

BREACHES OF THESE RESTRICTIONS MAY RESULT IN A PENALTY



HOUSEHOLD WASTE COLLECTION in Georgetown

Council seeks your support and help in the continued successful collection of household waste in Georgetown. Residents can help in the ongoing efficient collection of household waste through following a few simple rules:

- Don't over fill your bin as this causes problems in emptying bins with truck mechanism and can also attract birds which pull rubbish out of bins
- Bin lids should be closed properly at all times
- Break up or squash bulky items such as cardboard boxes before putting in bin
- Bins must be placed at kerb or edge of bitumen roadway for collection
- · Items on the ground beside the bins will not normally be picked up
- Due to council now permanently using the green garbage truck bins should be placed with pull handles/lid hinge facing the road

For Georgetown residents green waste can be deposited at the green waste area at the Georgetown Landfill on the Forsayth Road. In the future, the green waste at the tip will be converted to mulch for use in the town.







Recipes of the Month Chicken & Sweet Corn Soup

INGREDIENTS

- 1 litre chicken stock
- 1 tablespoon soy sauce
- 1 teaspoon finely grated ginger
- 310g can corn kernels
- 310g can creamed corn
- 3 small chicken breast fillets, thinly sliced

METHOD

Step 1: Place the chicken stock in a large saucepan with the soy sauce, ginger, corn kernels and creamed corn.

- Step 2: Cook over medium heat and simmer for 5 minutes.
- Step 3: Add the chicken and green onions and cook for 3-4 minutes or until chicken is cooked through.

Step 4: Serve sprinkled with extra chopped green onion.

<u>Pumpkín & Gnocchí Soup</u>

INGREDIENTS

- 2 tablespoons olive oil
- 1 brown onion, finely chopped
- 3 garlic cloves, sliced
- 1kg pumpkin, peeled, seeded, cut into 3cm pieces
- 2 cups Massel vegetable liquid stock
- 100g sliced pancetta, torn (optional for a vegetarian option)
- 2 tablespoons torn sage leaves
- 700g pkt ready made gnocchi

METHOD

Step 1: Heat half the oil in a large saucepan over medium heat. Cook onion and garlic for 5 minutes. Add pumpkin and stock and bring to the boil. Reduce heat and simmer, covered, for 15 minutes or until pumpkin is tender. Using a hand held blender, process soup until smooth. Season.

Step 2: Meanwhile, heat remaining oil in a large frying pan over medium-high heat. Cook pancetta and sage for 4-5 minutes or until crisp.

Step 3: Bring a large saucepan of salted water to the boil. Cook gnocchi for 2 minutes or until tender and they rise to the surface. Drain.

Step 4: Divide soup between serving bowls. Add gnocchi and top with pancetta mixture.
